## **Investing in Sustainable Peace**

The term of 'protracted or frozen conflicts' has come to mean four of the ongoing separatist conflicts on the territory of the former Soviet Union (Nagorny Karabakh, Abkhazia, South Ossetia, Transdniestria), 3 of which are belonging to the region of South Caucasus. When the USSR collapsed. several violent conflicts erupted in the region simultaneously. These conflicts resulted in tens of thousands of deaths and hundreds of thousands of refugees and internally displaced persons (IDPs). Whilst these armed conflicts are now considered frozen, clashes on demarcation lines periodically flare up and human rights violations continue.

The region is marked by political and economic instabilities, rising youth unemployment and numerous unresolved issues. Therefore, interethnic dialogue and regional cooperation is a hallmark of the work of GPPAC South Caucasus regional members. Our work is closely linked to the implementation of SDG16+ of the UN Agenda 2030; and to the landmark UN resolution 1325 on women, peace and security.

# **SOME IMPORTANT HIGHLIGHTS**

- The Network of Women Mediators of South Caucasus established on the initiative of International Center on Conflict and Negotiation– GPPAC regional secretariat. To date, 10 women peacebuilders have joined the network.
- Six new CSOs from Georgia, Armenia and Azerbaijan have joined the regional GPPAC network and enriched it with their expertise and experience.
- 15 members of the network of GPPAC freelance press officers in South Caucasus have produced more than 35 articles on peace and confidence building.

- For 2017-2019, GPPAC regional network members developed six policy papers on the issues related to conflict prevention
- The youth CSOs of Armenia, Georgia and Azerbaijan have engaged in the discussions and research of the salient peace issues in the region.
- A Conflict Prevention Toolbox has been developed to contribute to the implementation of SDG16 in the region.
- Essentials of human security from the GPPAC handbook have been translated and disseminated in the region.
