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## International Centre on Conflict and Negotiation

The **vision** of ICCN is a peaceful, tolerant and sustainable Georgia, with well developed civic and state institutions and a balanced distribution of powers.

The ICCN **mission** is to promote and develop non-violent approaches to disputes in Georgia and the South



Caucasus, to support the integration process of minority groups and to promote democratic processes by strengthening civil society actors at central and local level.

For the promotion and development of non-violent approaches to disputes a proactive and preventive approach is chosen, based on the needs of IDPs and refugees in our country. ICCN feels it is able to activate their participation in society and their capacity to solve daily conflicts in the community by negotiation and respectful dialogue. This will be done through the identification of community leaders and by training them in community development. At the same time, the capacity of women for conflict resolution will be activated and the society at large will be educated in accepting diversity and being tolerant.

## About ICCN

The International Center on Conflict and Negotiation (ICCN) is an independent, peace-making, research and training institution that was founded in 1994 thanks to financial support from the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation, and organizational support from the Center for International Security and Arms Control at Stanford University. ICCN was established with the aim of building peace and accord in a divided post-totalitarian society, putting its main effort on conflict prevention and resolution in the Caucasus region with special focus on Georgia. In the following years it became clear that reaching these objectives would be possible only by empowering civil society, advocating human rights, tightly cooperating with other important actors. All these have since become ICCN programmatic goals. In recent years ICCN has diversified its activities and partnership to assist social groups like internally displaced people (IDPs), returnees, ethnic minorities, religious minorities, young journalists and women's NGOs. Georgia is in the process of democratic transformation. Civil society organizations are vital for development and positive changes. ICCN has unique experience in
